

A LOOK AT UPCOUNTY

Historical areas like the John Poole House and General Store Museum are popular with residents and visitors, as well as the Historic Whites Ferry. People take in the scenery at Seneca Aqueduct and Riley's Lockhouse along the C&O Canal. Hiking, rock climbing, picnicking, and sight seeing are common at the peak of Sugarloaf Mountain.

The Upcounty area of Montgomery County includes:

POOLESVILLE—Named after its first settler, John Poole, who settled there in 1783—this tightly-knit community retains much of its historic charm.

DAMASCUS—Currently a commercial center for the northern part of the region, it remains a beautiful agrarian area with rolling hills and valleys.

BOYDS—A village for workers constructing the B&O Railroad in the 1870s, it is now served by the MARC train system. It is also home to Black Hills Regional Park and Little Seneca Lake.

BEALLSVILLE—On the road from Rockville to the Monocacy River and Nolands ferry, Beallsville was a strategic spot in the Civil War.

CLARKSBURG—Clarksburg is named for Native American trader William Clarke, and since 2000, there has been major growth.

CLARKSBURG PREMIUM OUTLETS

ABUNDANT REGIONAL SERVICES

The Sidney Kramer Upcounty Regional Services Center (SKURSC) is one of five Montgomery County outreach offices. The Upcounty Center is the largest of the five centers with 100,000 sq. ft. of space, and 11 agencies with services for citizens and businesses, including workforce development.

OPENING THE DOOR TO NEW BUSINESS

In 2018, the Montgomery County Council enacted a zoning amendment which will expand business options for wineries, breweries, cideries and distilleries located in the County's Agricultural Reserve.

THE AGRICULTURAL RESERVE

In 1980, the Montgomery County Council made one of the most significant land-use decisions in County history by creating the Agricultural Reserve. Heralded as one of the best examples of land conservation policies in the country, the Ag Reserve encompasses 93,000 acres—almost a third of the county's land resources—along the County's northern, western, and eastern borders. Farms here are very popular for spring pick-your-own strawberries, blueberries, and more. In the fall, families head to the pumpkin patch, and during the holidays, they cut fresh trees.

Enhances and protects the health and well-being of all Americans and foster advances in medicine. public health, and social services.







METRO SYSTEM

Washington, D.C.'s Metro system is one of the busiest public transit systems in the country, with 117 miles and 91 rail stops located throughout Maryland, D.C. and Virginia.

RIDE ON BUS SERVICE

Montgomery County has an active Ride On bus service, including options from Germantown and other points to the Shady Grove Metro Station. The Germantown Transit Center is a busy center, with plans to expand the location and services to UpCounty residents and businesses.

COMMUTER TRAINS

MARC trains provide efficient statewide transportation for commuters coming in and out of Montgomery County, with stops in Gaithersburg, Germantown, Rockville and Silver Spring. Amtrak also stops in the area, with a platform in Rockville.

TAKING A DRIVE

Near the I-95 corridor, Montgomery County is perfectly situated for travel up and down the east coast. The I-495 Capital Beltway to the south provides access to Washington, D.C. and Northern Virginia, with the ICC connecting the I-270 Tech corridor to I-95 and College Park.

Living in Montgomery County allows many residents to enjoy walkable streets, landscaped sidewalks, bikeways, trails, and paths for pedestrian circulation and connections to surrounding communities.

FUTURE UPCOUNTY TRANSPORTATION

County officials are looking into an **expansion** of the Germantown Transit Center to address the need for additional bus routes, serving Germantown, Clarksburg and Damascus.

The Milestone Transit Center project provides for a study of expansion of the transit center to address the need for additional commuter parking and bus bays for immediate-term, mid-term and long-term improvements. The existing center has 216 commuter parking spaces and two linear bus bays. Officials are also considering an Upcounty Park-and-Ride **Expansion** at the existing transit locations.






Purple Line train/Riverdale Park Station



The John Poole House is the oldest building in Poolesville. The General Store Museum furnishings are based on authenticated period inventories. The Museum Shop features antiques, collectibles, gifts, notepaper, pottery, toys, local books, and local art.

SUGARLOAF MOUNTAIN

Sugarloaf Mountain is a small mountain and park located 10 miles south of Frederick. Designated a National Natural Landmark, it is a favorite spot for hikers, bikers, and picnickers.

HISTORIC WHITES FERRY

Historic White's Ferry is the last of 100 ferries that used to operate on the Potomac River. This ferry, named after the confederate Civil War General Jubal A. Early, connects Whites Ferry Road in Montgomery County, Maryland with a road by the same name in Loudoun County, Virginia.

SENECA AQUEDUCT AND RILEY'S LOCKHOUSE

The C&O Canal had 11 aqueducts and 74 lift locks, but one was both a lift lock and an aqueduct. This engineering marvel is located at mile 22.7, at the mouth of Seneca Creek. Rileys Lockhouse is open for tours on Saturdays during the spring and fall. Local Girl Scouts in period dress guide visitors through the historic home.



CREATING A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION

Montgomery County is committed to leading by example in greenhouse gas emission reductions:

- Montgomery County purchases 100% of its electricity supply from clean sources
- County Government has installed more than six megawatts of solar photovoltaic panels on public facilities and is expected to exceed 11 megawatts by 2018
- County government operates a total of 243 electric and gasoline/electric hybrid vehicles
- The county's Department of Transportation serves 26 million passengers a year and operates 370 buses, all either hybrid electric, compressed natural gas, or clean diesel
- Montgomery County will complete its first two microgrids in 2018, enhanced with a combination of solar energy, and combined heat and power systems that convert electricity into natural gas
- Montgomery County became the first of only a handful of local governments to join the Subnational Global Climate Leadership Coalition, agreeing to pursue emission reductions consistent with a trajectory of 80 to 95 percent below 1990 levels by 2050

FIBER CONNECTIVITY

ultraMontgomery is a high-speed fiber network that connects our business, academic and federal institutions along major corridors and greatly improves communication. The technology-based, multi-year, economic development initiative aims to grow jobs by making gigabit broadband more affordable and widely available to public and private institutions in major corridors and transit-oriented communities within the County. In addition to private providers, the County operates its own 570mile government run fiber network, called FiberNet.

CELLULAR COVERAGE

Montgomery County has extensive 4G coverage from all four major wireless carriers—including Verizon, AT&T, Sprint, T-Mobile. Hughes Network Systems, one of the country's two leading satellite broadband providers is also headquartered in Montgomery County.

DATA SYSTEM ECOSYSTEM

Montgomery County offers its own mature commercial data center ecosystem. Two of these data centers include Bytegrid and Recovery Point. Bytegrid is a national provider of multi-tenant data centers. The maintainable and fault-tolerant design of this facility offers an ideal location for projects and expansion opportunities for businesses.



TAX CREDITS AND VENTURE CAPITAL FUNDING

MARYLAND BELIEVES IN BUSINESS

This region has grown into one of the wealthiest and most business-diverse areas in the country because Montgomery County and state leaders work together to make doing business here more profitable for corporations and their employees. Many incentives, exemptions and tax credits are available to offset your costs of moving to the world-class Upcounty region.

THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT FUND

The EDF grant is a financial incentive based on capital expenditures and job creation. Typically, the term of an EDF grant agreement is 10 years. Any grant over \$100,000 is subject to approval by the County Executive and the County Council. EDF payments are phased, based on the verification of the grantee's capital expenditures and certification of job creation milestones. Recapture provisions include pro-rata repayment if promised job numbers are not retained for the term of the grant agreement.

THE ENHANCED NEW JOBS TAX CREDIT

The ENJTC is a credit against the county's portion of real property and business personal property taxes. Businesses are eligible for a 24-year credit if they meet established job creation, wage, and square footage requirements. The credit is applied annually to Levy Year tax assessments. A business has six years from the notification date to create and fill the required number of new jobs and acquire and inhabit the new space. When this is accomplished, and the company has notified the County Department of Finance, the business will begin receiving the credit.

GREEN INCENTIVES

Commercial PACE Financing: Finance energy-saving upgrades through a property tax surcharge that is repaid over the life of the upgrade (potentially up to 100% of the cost for up to 20 years).

Green Business Certification Program: A voluntary recognition program to encourage businesses to reduce their ecological footprint. Certified businesses are promoted and listed in the Green Business Directory.

Rainscapes Rewards: Rebates up to \$10,000 for commercial property owners installing rain gardens and conservation landscaping, planting trees and implementing other projects that help control stormwater pollution.

Fuel Energy Tax Exemption for Onsite Clean

Energy: Electricity generated through on-site solar installation is exempt from the County's Fuel Energy Tax, which applies to fossil-fuel generated electricity and other building fuels.

Montgomery County Green Bank: Uses seed capital to spur private capital investment.

Tree Montgomery: Free shade trees are available to commercial property owners to manage stormwater, improve air quality, save energy and beautify property.







Super high-speed network connectivity covers the area with a dense mat of fiber networks and conduit that provides a rare combination of competitive, advanced telecommunication services at relatively low cost.

4G cellular coverage is also available from all four major wireless carriers (Verizon, AT&T, Sprint, T-Mobile). Since the launch of the County's ultraMontgomery program in 2014 to facilitate proliferation of ultra-high-speed broadband. the County has received and is processing hundreds of applications for 5G antenna systems.


